### TOUCHSTONES The Rev. Jaye Brooks



The other day, I was searching through my library of poetry and came across John Mercer's "Preparing for a Hike." As a soul-deep, near-Druid, nature-loving and breathing human being, I resonate with Mercer's poetic instructions for would-be hikers.

The lines I like best are: "consider the route / imagine your way through the good route / and also the other route, the less preferred, / the one you'll need when the first proves impassable."

Time and time again, out in the wilderness—and once, on a can't-go-wrong, perfect-for-beginners walk in the woods—I've found myself turned around, overtired, worried, and occasionally terrified. Because the good route, the one that everyone prefers, always has surprises and often becomes impassable.

Here we are in the middle of 2020's less-preferred route: the way we had planned to go has suddenly and irrevocably become impassable.

Cue Tolkien's wizard, Gandalf the Grey, saying "You shall not pass!"

Years ago, I attended a UUA conference on what congregational life would look like in 2020. Ha! Completely wrong. Lots of good ideas, mind you, but no one then came even close to guessing how impassable the path ahead would become.

Nevertheless, the speakers at the conference urged us to do all the things that Shelter Rock's ministers and congregational leaders are trying to do now—now that we are off the path, off a cliff, and stretching our arms out into wings.

The advice? Listen to the people. Find out what they need. Don't resist the reality that things are different. Find ways to rise to new challenges.

### **Protecting Democracy in Maine**

Many of us are still reeling from the passing of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg—for everything her life and career meant to progressing gender justice in this country, and also what it portends for the future of our highest court. With critically important issues set to come before the Supreme Court

in the next year—including health care, reproductive justice, immigrants' rights, and more—many Veatch grantees are working tirelessly to do all they can to influence the balance of power on the Supreme Court and in the U.S. Senate.

Veatch grantee <u>Maine People's Alliance</u> has been actively working to protect the integrity of the election in the state, while also increasing voter turnout. As part of an intensive public education campaign, the organization is ensuring voters understand the importance of the election in the state, and that the outcome will have national implications.

Their non-partisan civic engagement work is ensuring voters in the state are registered, understand the issues at stake in the election, and have a plan to vote safely amid the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. Maine People's Alliance has hired a team of 23 canvassers who have been contacting voters every night since August. In just the past month, this team has already spoken to over 1,300 voters, educating them on ways to request a mail-in ballot, or to make plans to vote in person, safely. Through twice weekly phone and text banks they are increasing the number of voters they can reach before election day.

Maine People's Alliance has a robust media arm in the form of MaineBeacon.com, which features online articles and podcasts. This successful media strategy is keeping voters informed and engaged. Their articles just on the state of the Senate race, for instance, reached 30,758 viewers in the past month, and generated another 6,137 engagements (likes, shares, comments). The group uses this media resource, as well, to help protect the integrity of the electoral process. Several articles report on the state's progress towards meeting the increased demand for mail-in voting this year. Maine's Secretary of State Office estimates that between 60 to 65 percent of voters will cast an absentee ballot. The group is working to ensure voters who requested absentee ballots actually received them, return them as quickly as possible, and then track them via a newly created online database to ensure their vote is counted.

For those who will vote in person, they are making sure enough polling places are open and functioning to meet the demand. Of particular concern is having enough poll workers—a job most often filled by older Americans who are at higher risk of complicating factors due to COVID-19. During the 2018 election, more than 60 percent of polling workers were 60 or over. Maine People's Alliance has been active in recruiting young people in the state to work these jobs instead, helping keep poll sites open.

Maine People's Alliance's civic engagement work is not limited to increasing voter turnout—nor will the group's efforts to protect and expand democracy stop after the coming election, regardless of the outcome. Whether it be efforts to mobilize its members in support of <a href="racial justice reforms">racial justice reforms</a>, pressuring elected officials to take action on <a href="climate change">climate change</a>, or increasing support for <a href="affordable housing">affordable housing</a> initiatives, Maine People's Alliance provides meaningful opportunities for civic participation all year long.

Maine People's Alliance is just one of many grantees engaged in critically important civic engagement work this year. #### Harvest the Power with UU the Vote

Since January 2020, when we held three UU the Vote training sessions, we have been participating with our siblings in the faith in efforts to get out the vote and urging citizens to exercise their most fundamental right. We've shared voting information through post cards and letters. We've staffed phone banks and text banks. We've staffed UU the Vote Office Hours. All activities will culminate in a final push beginning Wednesday, October 21.



According to Nicole Pressley, National UU the Vote Organizer, "Harvest the Power Week of Action is a call to faithful action and deep organizing.... We have witnessed remarkable sustained protests to declare that Black Lives Matter, to fight fascism, and to combat police violence. Unitarian Universalists are building partnerships and bringing our values into the public square in solidarity with justice movements that seek collective liberation. We have activated 450 congregations, thousands of volunteers, and reached out to 1.3 million voters across the US." Ms. Pressley continues: "Today, the stakes are high. But today, we show up. We show up in larger numbers. We show up more rooted in our faith. We show up declaring Fannie Lou Hamer's words, 'none of us are free, until all of us are free.' We show up to follow the leadership of those most impacted, to build political agency alongside our beloved siblings." We show up to HARVEST THE POWER!

During this week, we have been invited to host a phone bank. We get to choose the date and time, the state that we will call, and run the event. Will you support the planning of this event? There is something for each one of you reading this to do. We need a group coordinator to manage the project; a Zoom host to start and run Zoom during the phonebank; a communications coordinator to send out reminder emails and promote the event; and phone bank staff for volunteer training and answering tech questions during the event. and phone bank support volunteers who run the training before calling starts and answer tech questions during the phone bank.

UU the Vote has provided a detailed <u>tool kit</u> that will help us plan and execute a successful event. 

### Keeping Forests and Trees Standing

One of the best defenses against global warming and the climate crisis is our trees and forests. They absorb greenhouse gases and help biodiversity. Indigenous people depend upon them for life and livelihood. However, corporations,



banks, and consumers disregard the impact of their destruction for profit or product as carbon dioxide and other gases are released. Indeed, we are choking life everywhere.

Forests are a natural trapping technology. They absorb about half of global greenhouse gases annually. Doubly beneficial are rain forests. They trap condensation, creating low-hanging clouds which deflect sunlight back to them. Nevertheless, countries like Brazil are purposely burning their rain forests to create farmland. As the world's largest exporter of beef, plus the growing of soy and corn, these stored greenhouse gases are released increasing global warming. In Indonesia, to acquire palm oil, the peat lands account for millions of hectares of tropical rainforest destruction. Other contributing factors worldwide are illegal logging and poaching, road construction, mineral and fossil fuel extraction, as in Canada.

Governments, companies, investors are the beneficiaries of forest destruction. Although 1.6 billion people worldwide and animals live near or in them, the plight of forests is ignored. Indigenous territories account for 80 percent of our biodiversity, yet covering only 22 percent of the world's land. The Rainforest Action Network (RAN) is trying to help by promoting the notion of "zero net deforestation," and pinpointing countries and companies most responsible. Indonesia, the Amazon, and Congo Basin head the list by destroying the oldest ecosystems on earth for profit.

In 2020, RAN also launched the Keep Forests Standing Campaign. JPMorgan Chase, and companies like General Mills, Nestle, Pepsi, Dunkin' brands, Kraft, Heinz, and ConAgra Foods were targeted. They "promised" to adopt responsible policies. But what about replanting efforts? These cannot work unless farmers and Big Ag stop degrading the soil. We must promote organic practices that nourish the soil. Then biodiversity will reemerge and trees can be replanted and established. This solution includes getting agricultural stakeholders to end slash-and burn-practices and oppose forest destruction. We must support tree revitalization just as Africa did, using quick growing, hardy "pioneer" trees.

In the United States, the Arbor Day Foundation's Trees for America program helps replenish trees everywhere: towns, cities, parks, and streets. But the rainforest, "the lungs of the earth," needs our attention. We must boycott products from countries and companies responsible as well as divest from them.

### Nuns on the Bus and New Hour for Women and Children

There are virtual plays, art classes, church services, political rallies, and exercise classes. Thank heaven for all of them at this time. Now, there's a virtual trip by the Nuns on the Bus. You may remember when Sister Simone Campbell of Nuns on the Bus addressed the Democratic National Convention in 2016. She reminded the audience that we ARE our brothers' keepers. We ARE our sisters' keepers. Sister Simone Campbell is the Executive Director of NETWORK Lobby for Catholic Social Justice.

This new, seventh annual trip will deliver the message: Who We Elect Matters. The virtual tour will register voters and discuss "equally sacred priorities" like racial justice, economic equality, health care access, immigration reform, and the housing crisis. Sister Simone said, "We must elect leaders who can empathize with the most marginalized among us, understand the urgent need to keep one another safe from disease, end structural racism, fix our broken immigration system, support social programs that pull families out of poverty, and expand health care access for all people." At the rally, Speaker Nancy Pelosi remarked, "I've always said thank god for the nuns. Without the nuns, we would have never had passed the Affordable Care Act. Without the nuns, we would have never saved the Affordable Care Act."

The tour will conduct site visits designed to showcase issues that are at stake in the election. On September 22, a visit was made with New Hour for Women and Children, an organization that our Women's Group has been connected to for a number of years. New Hour was founded on Long Island to provide meaningful support to current and formerly incarcerated women, their children and families. You may have seen the women and children baking cookies at holiday time, enjoying lunch, crafts, and a visit from Santa in our Social Hall. You may have attended our end-ofyear Luncheon and Fashion Show that featured some of us and some of them modeling thrift shop clothes. When we found out that Nuns on the Bus selected New Hour for their first site visit, we were delighted. Executive Director Serena Liguori and Pam Neely were interviewed by Sister Simone. They described the needs of the women who had no available substantive programs to assist them while incarcerated or when released, with the number one goal of reuniting with their children. They described their 15-week Emerge class that is about empowerment. I can remember attending a very emotional graduation where the graduates expressed their gratitude. I recall one graduate who was especially grateful that Serena wouldn't give up on her. Serena related that 9 out of 10 of the women are victims of domestic violence and mental health issues. New Hour ministers to the women and children in need with a 2 percent recidivism rate as opposed to more than 65 percent for those without help. Sister Simone expressed that she would not have suspected that these needs exist on Long Island. Maybe even you had no idea.

We wish the Nuns on the Bus a very successful virtual trip with very real results. We celebrate the work that New Hour does for traumatized and punished women and children on Long Island.


