TOUCHSTONES Rev. Jaye Brooks



Each month one of the ministers writes this piece we call "Touchstones." I like that name. I like the *idea* of a touchstone—something that we return to again and again and, with a touch, remind ourselves of who we aspire to be.

One of the aspirations in Unitarian Universalist communities is that disagreement need not mean disrespect. I believe, and have seen,

that people in loving religious community can disagree strongly and yet listen carefully to one another, with respect.


During July's Listening Sessions with Rev. Aaron Payson, members of this congregation gathered to hear one another's thoughts about the manner in which Shelter Rock honors our Ministers Emeritus/ Emerita. This is a potentially contentious issue, so it was important that we use a healthy process that encouraged respectful communication—and people were respectful. The scribe notes from those conversations will soon be available, as will be Rev. Payson's report about the process and his observations.

A "healthy process" is essential. A key element is that members gather face-to-face and another is that they converse (and listen) in small groups. For the Listening Sessions, members were onsite in one another's physical presence; others were online and able to see and be seen. The small groups reported out so that everyone could bear witness to the differences and commonalities of perspective. Someone in each group acted as scribe and took notes. These mostly handwritten scribe notes have been given to staff member Tammy Weil, who is creating a spreadsheet that includes all the notes. If any member is concerned that their group's ideas are not reported accurately, Tammy has preserved the originals.

This is a degree of democracy and transparency that helps lay a foundation for mutual trust and respectful future dialogue. Just as the Board will review and consider the notes from the Listening Sessions, so can members. Through this healthy process, the membership can agree on a consistent, clear plan to honor Shelter Rock's retired ministers.

One issue evident in the scribe notes is member concern for consistency and fairness.

Members want to understand the difference between a "payout" to ministers who left via negotiated resignation—they were asked to leave—and ministers who initiated retirement at a time of their choosing. This difference matters. The annual cycle by which UU ministers find another position in ministry, and the UUA review required when a congregation initiates the minister's resignation, can mean months of unemployment for which the minister did not plan.

What also matters is that questions like these are asked and answered in a public way that allows all members to witness—and likewise allows all members to witness any challenges to the answers as well as responses to those challenges.

In some congregations I've served, a few members have sent emails about contentious issues using the "bcc" feature so recipients don't know who else received the message. Obviously it's impossible for anyone who didn't receive the email to challenge the assertions in it. Even the members who do receive the message cannot share their responses with other recipients. A point of view delivered in a manner that cannot be witnessed and responded to communally is thus left to percolate underground, potentially creating latent division that may not be visible until conflict is full-blown. This is not a healthy process.

Disagreement need not mean disrespect. This is a touchstone.

When people look one another in the eye and genuinely seek to hear differing points of view, there is no disrespect. When all are witness to the differing points of view, there is no disrespect. If our Shelter Rock community needs more discussion and reflection about how to honor retiring ministers, let's have it openly, using a healthy process.

And—heartfelt thanks to everyone who attended the Listening Sessions and to everyone who reads the report and scribe notes once they are available—as they will be—to all.

DENOMINATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE (DAC) Barry Nobel, Chair



Updates from the Chair

The mission of the Denominational Affairs Committee (DAC) is to encourage the members of UUCSR to develop and experience a larger understanding of themselves as Unitarian Universalists on a national and international level, and to facilitate the interrelationship between UUCSR and the wider denomination and its affiliates.

Members of DAC assist in planning for General Assembly (GA), finding delegates, and assisting them in their service to the congregation. Members of DAC serve as liaisons to various national and international organizations, such as the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), UU United Nations Office (UU@UN), Partner Church Council and our partner church in Csikszereda, Romania, the Long Island Area Council (LIAC), and the UU Service Committee (UUSC). In future *Quest* editions, you may expect reports from these entities.

Ukraine: Partner Church liaison Elena Litescu reports that Csikszereda has received \$1400, proceeds from the recent Partner Church Auction and is using it in partnership with the Diaconal Centre of the Transcarpathian Reformed Church to assist refugees inside the Transcarpathia and Berehovo regions of Ukraine. Also, UUSC has received the \$200,000 Crisis Grant from UUCSR to assist their partners in Poland and Hungary in refugee relief, with special focus on those from marginalized communities: LGBTQ+, Black, Disabled, and other people.

Racial Justice: Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, is the foundation for all of the work of the UUA and its member congregations and covenanted communities. It is the covenant to which all our congregations and covenanted communities pledge themselves when they become members of the UUA. Current Principles and Purposes were last revised in 1987, and the Article II Commission is charged with revising them once again. It is expected that the Eighth Principle of Unitarian Universalism, which calls for direct action to dismantle racism and other oppressions, and which was unanimously adopted by UUCSR, will be incorporated into UUA Bylaws, and Principles and Purposes.

LIAC: Jim Smith reports that members have agreed to take more responsibility for organizing meetings. They hope to re-open the Sophia Fahs Camp, which has been closed due to Covid.

Veatch Grantees Pushing Climate Action Forward

Veatch grantees across the country are pushing for big, bold environmental policies at the local, state, and federal levels. The most recent example: a federal climate bill, signed into law on August 16, 2022, will become the most comprehensive piece of climate change legislation ever enacted.

Several of the grassroots groups affiliated with longtime Veatch grantee People's Action, including West Virginia Citizen Action Group, were key to keeping pressure on local leaders, like Senator Joe Manchin, to support the bill. Veatch grantees also worked to ensure low-income communities and communities of color, those disproportionately impacted by climate change, will benefit from the legislation. The bill includes \$60 billion to address the disproportionate burden of pollution in these communities, including a \$9 billion rebate for low-income communities to retrofit their homes to be more energy efficient.

Veatch grantees affiliated with the People's Action network including TakeAction Minnesota, Down Home North Carolina, Iowa Citizens for Community Improvement, and others have spent years speaking with voters about the need to support pro-climate leaders and policies. People's Action hosts regular virtual and in person training and education sessions on the subject of climate. For those interested in getting involved or trained to participate in issue canvassing to hold conversations with others about climate change, the organization's "People and Planet First" page includes more information.

Veatch grantees continue to collaborate, innovate, and build power in numbers, as they fight for the better world we so desperately need, and that we know through our values to be possible.

Nationwide Crisis Line

On July 16, 2022, a new nationwide crisis line, with the easy to remember number 988, went into operation. This new number is a way for people to connect with help and support during a mental health, substance use, or suicide crisis.



Now anyone in crisis who calls or texts 988 will be connected with trained

counselors who are part of the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline network (formerly known as the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline). Individuals can also chat with counselors via the Lifeline's website (988lifeline.org). The number is not just for individuals contemplating suicide. 988 is a number to call for suicide, mental health, and substance use-related crises, or any kind of emotional distress—not just suicide-related crises. (Police dispatchers will continue to answer 911 calls and will send requests for crisis intervention teams to 988.)

Ideally, when someone in New York calls/texts/chats with 988, the person taking the call/text/chat will be a team member at a crisis contact center. According to a <u>statement</u> from Gov. Kathy Hochul, New York State currently has 13 Crisis Centers with two more in development.

Crisis Centers are important not only for answering calls. When staffed by mental health professionals and peer counselors, they provide short-term stabilization as well as access to community resources for individuals in crisis. They cut down on emergency room visits where people in crisis often experience long waits and can be released without successful intervention.

Although Nassau County has a Mobile Crisis Team that responds seven days a week from 10:00 AM to 11:00 PM and will go to an individual's home, it does not yet have crisis stabilization centers. In Suffolk County, DASH (Diagnostic, Assessment, and Stabilization Hub) has a center where individuals in crisis can receive immediate attention 24/7. Both the Mobile Crisis Team and DASH respond to emergency calls where police presence might only exacerbate the crisis. Long Island residents can advocate with county legislators for more stabilization centers so that people with suicidal ideation and mental health, substance use-related, and houselessness crises receive the most helpful interventions.

Funding is available for these centers. According to Governor Hochul's statement, "The FY 2023 Enacted Budget included \$35 million to significantly expand 988 crisis call center capacity throughout New York State. This funding will increase to \$60 million on a full annual basis starting in FY 2024." Funding is also available from other agencies and the federal government.



ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE Carole Alexander, Chair



Are You Interested in Gender Equity? Climate Justice? Racial Equity?

If you are interested in any or all of these areas of social justice, then you will be pleased to know that our endowment has added three new funds this year that specialize in each.

The Racial Equity Fund only buys bonds that benefit minority

communities and tackles social disparities with Affordable Health and Rehab Care, Jobs, Neighborhood Revitalization, Housing, Education, and Childcare. Initial investments were directed to Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

The Gender Diversity Fund only invests in companies with a commitment to gender diversity that can show greater than 30 percent of females on the Board, and greater than 15 percent on the Executive Committee.

Climate Justice Exchange Traded Fund (ETF) only invests in companies that can address environmental problems with clean energy and sustainable consumption.

The Endowment Committee has also increased exposure to socially responsible investments from less than 10 percent a few years ago to 56 percent today.

Socially Responsible Investing (SRI) is not new to UUCSR—we were doing it when it was very unpopular. Shelter Rock is still doing today what we have always been doing: funds exclude "sin stocks," such as fossil fuels, tobacco, environmental polluters, and gun manufacturers, etc. This is called negative screening. But "sustainable" investing has currently come into vogue. That is, picking companies that are doing the right things.

The market has become excited about companies that take care of the environment, treat their workforce better, and handle their governance well. The term "ESG" stands for Environmental, Social, and Corporate Governance. ESG funds have positive screening; they select only companies that have the highest grades in ESG criteria. That is how we are able to get these very specialized funds. Why have ESG funds suddenly gained popularity you might ask? Because they have been outperforming non-ESG funds. It's very exciting that companies focused on sustainability, advancing women, and properly rewarding their workers, are also more profitable.







GREEN SANCTUARY COMMITTEE Stephen Ruocco, Chair

This article demonstrates the congregation's stewardship of the Earth and commitment to the Seventh Principle.

This Is a Busy Outdoor Season at UUCSR!

The lovely pollinator gardens are in full bloom and quite showy. Nestled on the great lawn off the Veatch mansion backyard, the compact gardens attract butterflies, gold finches and a host of native insects. Endangered monarch butterflies stop by to feed and hopefully lay some eggs on the milkweed plants.

A short while ago, as part of our land management stewardship, invasive vines and plants were removed from a 100-foot swath around the lawn/forest border. Vines were covering and weakening the trees reducing their access to sunlight. Burning bush so densely shaded the ground as to prevent the next generation of trees from growing and making a food desert of the under-story. Planting of native species will commence in the fall. We still have plenty of burning bush to deal with beyond the 100-foot clearing and along the woodland trail.

Next time you visit the congregation, take note of the window treatments on our north facing windows. See the dots? They have been installed to reduce bird strikes. A bird's eye view of windows shows a reflection of clear skies and safe passage. Our window dots are designed to make the glass look like an impenetrable blockade. According to multiple sources including the *Washington Post*, birds flying into windows causes up to one billion bird deaths in the US each year. Even stunned birds that fly off often die from collision injuries later. As reported in *National Geographic*, roaming house cats cause more deaths of birds then window strikes. Cats also prey on small mammals, amphibians, and reptiles, putting stresses on those populations. More window treatments are planned at UUCSR in the near future.

When you next visit the congregation, look to the patio where the Homecoming Picnic is held. It is being redeveloped to make it more usable for picnics, outdoor meetings, and safer to traverse. The building plan is taped to the lobby window. Native plants will be planted over the next phase. This is another Land Management project.

Finally, the Green Sanctuary committee is hosting ReWild summer interns every Wednesday morning. Up to ten high school students visit our property to learn about

wildlife, ecology, and help with invasive plant removal. We've partnered with Seatuck Environmental Group to give the interns tours of our woodlands and vernal pond. The pond is a wildlife refuge and place for young frogs and salamanders to hatch and develop before venturing onto land. We also partnered with Prof. Lisa Fillipi of Hofstra University to guide ReWild interns on an educational coyote forest walk. This ReWild program is a beneficial community outreach and in line with our Seventh Principle.


We will also continue to offer the Annual Men's Group events that have become fun for all:


