**The Courage To Feel** In a morning of emotional practice, we sing, we meditate, we reflect on our lives. "You have to accept what comes," Eleanor Roosevelt said, "and the only important thing is that you meet it with courage and with the best that you have to give." Transitions are challenging! Starting a new job, for example—or ending an old one—requires some perspective taking, and maybe even a little courage. Relationships have to be established, decisions have to be made, cultures have to be discovered... and one's sense of self needs to be kept intact!

Transitions are challenging because they are "dis-ordered." There is a logic to most

stories: they have a beginning, a middle, and an end. We understand how they move from one moment to another. When there are plot twists and new characters and surprises along the way, we usually have a sense that those novelties are coherent with the story.

But transitions start with an end, and then have a messy middle, and finally a beginning of what is new. I made a decision, for example, that my call to ministry in Baltimore had come to an end. Discovering that end and communicating it well to my leadership and the larger congregation was how the transition began. It started with an end.

Then we had months of me tying up loose ends and saying goodbye—all the while discovering what might be next in my career. Finding this UU Congregation at Shelter Rock was a great joy. But it made the "messy middle" of my transition even more complicated.

William Bridges calls this the neutral zone. This "messy middle" is the place where people have the courage to let go of any negativity about leaving the past behind, and the courage to have openness to the new things that they are discovering, the new situation they are entering.

An analogy is that it is like crossing the street. When you have stepped off the curb, you have declared an ending. Once in the street, you might find traffic coming from both directions. You might find people moving at different speeds. You might encounter things like kids on tricycles, middle-aged folk in compensatory sports cars, some people plodding along just two miles over the speed limit. (That's me.) You might encounter a tandem semi heading right at you. You might, yourself, be the non-attentive person who trips someone else up as they are trying to cross the *Continued on page 2*

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road, too. In this neutral zone, we need courage to observe, to step forward or backward as the circumstances change, and even to rest for a moment on the double yellow line at the center of the road.

Finally, one crosses the road and steps up on to the other side. There it is! That curb is the beginning that marks the end of the transition and the start of the new relationship, with new opportunities and even a few challenges that pertain to the new place.

This congregation that I am pledged to serve and am coming to love is in the midst of some transitions. Having an Associate Minister for Congregational Life is something new. I hope we are courageous in determining the contours of that office. We are also preparing to bring on a few new staff positions to fill gaps left by some resignations over the summer. This neutral zone we share allows us to let go and to move forward in hope—if we have the courage to do so. We meet this moment with the gifts of our faith: reason, compassion, equity, humility, justice. And a healthy reliance on our collective conscience.

It's fall, friends, a time of transition. It's fall, friends, a time for courage.

#### NY Veatch Grantees Demonstrate How To Treat Migrants and Asylum Seekers with Dignity

Over the last several months, conservative <u>governors in several</u> <u>southern states</u> have transported thousands of migrants from Central and South America to states in the north. Over 17,000 immigrants have arrived this way in New York State alone. Conservative leaders are

sending these migrants—many of whom have traveled up to 3,000 miles by foot to cross into the United States after fleeing poverty, persecution, and violence in their home countries—to states such as New York, using their suffering to make a political point. Nonetheless, Veatch grantees like <u>Make the Road NY</u> have stepped up to meet the needs of these new arrivals.

Staff and members of Make the Road NY, among other grassroots groups in the state, are mobilizing to greet and welcome the immigrants at bus terminals; offer resources, cash, and even cell phones to help with their transition to the city; and continue to

fight for long-term reforms and structural changes to the country's immigration system. On the federal level, Make the Road NY is fighting for a pathway to citizenship for the 11 million immigrants already living in the US and for fixes to the asylum process. At the state level, Make the Road is pushing for additional resources for housing and legal needs.

Perhaps most importantly, however, Make the Road NY is demonstrating how to treat new arrivals with care and compassion. The long-term funding that Veatch provides means our grantees carry out this critical work not just during times of immediate need, but year-round, as they train, uplift, and support grassroots leaders —including new immigrants, undocumented workers, parents, and young people—to organize for change. They are building a world in which every person is treated with the dignity and respect they deserve.

The Unitarian Universalist Veatch Program at Shelter Rock provides support for efforts within the religious and spiritual mission of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock where their purposes are best served by outside agencies acting under the Veatch Program and the Congregation.

#### Promise the Children

Unitarian Universalists are known for supporting a variety of social justice issues and responding by organizing groups to sustain their efforts. Among these groups is an organization that advocates for the needs of children: <u>Promise the</u> <u>Children.</u>

The UU Service Committee founded

Promise the Children in 1997 to increase preschool programs in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Buoyed by the success of that campaign, the organization sought and gained status as a 501(c)3 educational charity to advocate for government programs that would keep children and their families out of poverty and homelessness. Since 2014, they have taken on the issues of universal early education and childcare for all, especially low-income families.

Most recently, <u>Promise the Children</u> has been advocating for the passage of H.R. 7076: Supporting Children's Mental Health Care Access Act of 2022. This bill "would increase access to mental health care services and provide direct funding to schools for mental health promotion and suicide prevention."

There has always been a need for more funding for mental health services for all people. The pandemic has only heightened that need, especially for children who, according to the <u>US Surgeon</u> <u>General</u>, are facing a mental health crisis situation.

In his <u>directive of December 7, 2021</u>, Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy outlined the scope of the problem. "The pandemic added to the pre-existing challenges that America's youth faced. It disrupted the lives of children and adolescents, such as in-person schooling, in-person social opportunities with peers and mentors, access to health care and social services, food, housing, and the health of their caregivers. The pandemic's negative impacts most heavily affected those who were vulnerable to begin with, such as youth with disabilities, racial and ethnic minorities, LGBTQ+ youth, low-income youth, youth in rural areas, youth in immigrant households, youth involved with the child welfare or juvenile justice systems, and homeless youth. This Fall, a coalition of the nation's leading experts in pediatric health declared a national emergency exit disclaimer icon in child and adolescent mental health."

#### Socially Responsible Investment (SRI) Committee News

On behalf of UUCSR, the SRI Committee, with the support of the Board of Trustees, has invested in two agricultural Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFI organizations): Iroquois Valley Farms and Foodshed Capital.

Iroquois Valley Farms is an organic

farmland real estate investment trust that works with missiondriven investors to provide organic and regenerative farmers land security through long-term leases and mortgages. Although its first investments were in Iroquois County IL, they have grown to include many midwestern counties, the southwestern US, and one farm in New York State. Farmers are given support and direction while they expand their farms and follow a protocol to convert to organic farming. Iroquois Valley Farms is committed to social responsibility, environmental soundness, and economic viability. With their support, farmers are regenerating the land, the food system, and the farm economy.

Foodshed Capital was founded in 2019 to provide financial stewardship to small family farms and businesses in Virginia and the southeastern US. Before farmers can sell at local farmers' markets, a farmer needs land, but not every farmer has the same purchasing power. Navigating the farm funding landscape can be extremely challenging, especially for owners of small, family farms. Foodshed Capital lends to and supports farmers who are disenfranchised from the traditional financial system including low-income/low-asset individuals and families, Black and brown families, women and non-binary people, immigrants and indigenous communities (BIPOC farmers). Foodshed's Black Farmer Equity Fund offers zero percent unsecured loan capital for Black farmers. Farmers also receive technical assistance, and bookkeeping, marketing, and product development assistance at no or low cost.

The SRI Committee seeks out and reviews organizations that share our Unitarian Universalist values and Principles and is committed to investing where there is need.

#### Megadrought and Climate Change

Megadrought is a severe drought lasting more than two decades. In our era of climate change, this has become more common. It has already affected 10 US states as well as northern Mexico. It is linked to temperatures caused by fossil fuels releasing greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. Consequently, the megadrought footprint is everywhere.

As temperatures rise to triple digits in the Northwestern US, it has already killed more than one billion marine animals in the Salish Sea. Since 2000, the high temperatures and drought in the Southwest have stressed all wildlife and ecosystems there. During last June in Arizona, birds fell from the sky from heat exhaustion and raptors abandoned their nests. The drought that began in 2000 continues to stress wildlife in the Southwest. Plants wither, entire landscapes dry up, and animals die. Wildfires out West have emerged engulfing entire forest areas and landscapes. On June 29, a heat wave lasted an entire month from the Yukon to Northern California and western Montana. There were 600 heat-related deaths reported by the Centers for Disease Control. Recently, there were more than 1,700 heat-related deaths in Spain and Portugal.

This "extreme heat is more deadly for humans than any other type of natural disaster," said the National Wildlife's Federation Chief Scientist Bruce Stein. He added that animals usually die, but have many techniques to avoid over heating: sweating, panting, shade, and changing their foraging time from either late to early. Fish, however, get cooked in rivers. Only 2.6 percent of juvenile salmon survived last summer in California's Sacramento River. Humans are luckier with air-conditioning, shady areas, and water to drink or cool themselves. They can survive, but those without these aids cannot.

Still it is up to humans to help our animals and ecosystems survive megadroughts. Fortunately, three-quarters of all water resources in the US are on private land. The farmers and ranchers own them and want to help. The US National Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is teaching them how to keep their water longer. Creating low-tech structures like beaver dams create ponds, recharge flood plains, and slow water flow from seasonal springs. Strategically mound and mud tree branches help to spread water across meadows. Hand-built restoration like this is cheap compared to high-tech, engineered ones. Nature becomes the ruler of restoration.

But until we stop leasing land to fossil fuel companies, an overheated planet that lacks biodiversity will become a barren one.
