A Message from the President

At the risk of using too many football references, I will just say that after testing positive for Covid at the beginning of December, I took a bye week and stepped back from my phone and computer. That gave me a chance to rest up, review, and reset. The time period between Thanksgiving and New Years Day is always a bit of a blur anyway, so

having an excuse to shut down and isolate without feeling very sick allowed me to actually look at what was going on around me.

And I realized just how much is happening at Shelter Rock and how much more will be happening in the new year. After approving the Strategic Plan in September, the Board of Trustees brought back bagels on Sundays before Service and the Cafe afterwards because members asked for more time to be together in community. We have begun planning Friday Night events which will combine spiritual renewal with old fashioned good times. A Leadership Team that will engage the congregation in plans for managing our beautiful property has begun meeting, and a Life Safety Leadership Team will be looking at security and accessibility issues at Shelter Rock.

In our continuing work on governance and organizational structure at UUCSR, the Board of Trustees has organized an advocacy committee on policy drafting which will be looking into simplifying and clarifying the authority, accountability, and responsibility of our groups and committees. And as the developmental work of Rev. Brooks winds down, the Board has begun organizing a Ministerial Search Committee to bring a new contract minister to UUCSR this summer. Along with Rev. Olson, this new minister will work under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Fenimore, whose position as Lead Minister will be brought to the congregation for affirmation in January.

In 2023, members of the congregation will be asked if they want to participate at General Assembly in June. Being a delegate for UUCSR is a challenging but rewarding experience that every member should take advantage of sometime during their time at Shelter Rock. We will also all be asked to join the All-Congregation Retreat in May which will take place on Memorial Day weekend at Camp Zeke in Lakewood, PA. That event is often described by members as one of the most memorable of their time in the congregation.

I am glad to be feeling stronger now and looking forward to all the work ahead for the Board of Trustees and all the members of UUCSR. I want to thank all the staff at Shelter Rock who always provide amazing support as we plan programs and events that are meaningful and memorable. I hope the holidays find you all healthy and happy and that the new year inspires you to step up and maybe step out of your comfort zone and get involved.

A Visit to Greentree Foundation

The Greentree Foundation, UUCSR's neighbor to the west, is undertaking a multi-faceted program to restore and enhance their natural land areas which should be a model for UUCSR. The Land Management Leadership Team (LMLT) recommends UUCSR use Greentree's program as a model after its tour of their property on November 14, 2022.

The non-profit Greentree Foundation, which owns the 400-acre estate originally held by Payne Whitney, manages extensive grounds consisting of grasslands and woods. That philanthropic foundation now operates their property as a conference center for the United Nations and other groups involved in world peace and justice.

Greentree employs full-time staff and engages numerous vendors to undertake their sustainable land management program. Recently the Foundation hired a full-time naturalist who has been assembling data about the property's natural resources. For example, coyote scat has been collected and analyzed to determine that their main prey is raccoons. The hope is that the natural resource data will inform future land management decision making.

The LMLT was most impressed with Greentree's work removing winged euonymus, commonly known as burning bush, from their woodlands. This invasive plant, if left unchecked, takes over the entire forest floor and prevents native trees from growing. Over time our woodland would become primarily winged euonymus and Norway maples.

During the tour, the LMLT saw a pump station operated by the Water Authority of Great Neck North on property taken from Greentree through eminent domain. The station which contains two groundwater pumps is evidence of the importance of the site as a source of drinking water. Greentree, UUCSR, and two contiguous golf courses all hold undeveloped open spaces which are critical for groundwater recharge and aquifer protection. This undeveloped area is one of the largest areas in Nassau County to recharge the local aquifer.

In the past, Greentree mowed about 20 acres of grass. To reduce their carbon footprint and to encourage birds, pollinators, and other animal life, they have started only mowing selected areas a few times during the growing season. These areas are actively managed to encourage the growth of native grasses.

These are some of the land management actions Greentree has taken. Their land management program for both grasslands and their woods can serve as a model for UUCSR, inspiring members of the Congregation to undertake the same enhancement of the natural resource values of our land.

Cultivating Our Plastic Solutions Industry

The plastics industry is looking for sustainable solutions and circular options to keep plastics out of landfills and the oceans. This product is ubiquitous, globally polluting our planet. Its versatility, low density and conductivity, highly durable nature, plus versatility has caused its consumption to double in the last twenty years. From single-use items to containers and wrappers, we are choking this planet. Currently, many companies and industries are seeking ways to alleviate this harm to our air, land, and water by working toward recyclables or compostables within ten years. Included is a \$5 billion fund that is paid for by the plastics industry hoping to cut this pollution via a circular economy.

A linear economy is the one where we use an item once, then discard it. The new circular economy involves recycling, repairing, transforming an old item into a new one, and reusing plastics to cut our greenhouse gases. It will make sustainability an integral part of construction, healthcare, agriculture and manufacturing, etc. This circularity of materials will help to eliminate plastic packaging replacing it with recyclable material. One of the leaders in this effort is Honeywell. Kevin Quest, global business lead at that company, is focusing on petrochemical and technology processes. He said, "Currently, 60 percent of their budget goes toward sustainable solutions (R&D) Investments in UpCycle Technology to expand types of plastics that can be recycled." Plastics can be made with a lower carbon footprint.

Another company, Jamestown Plastics in Brocton, NY, recently developed a way to keep plastic trays out of landfills. The method is to collect old trays, grind them up, and send them to an extruder. New recycled material forms new plastic trays. But good legislation should tackle this problem. California is fighting back to eliminate this ubiquitous material. Under the leadership of The Nature Conservancy, a bipartisan bill passed in June 2022 for single-use plastics to be reduced by 25 percent and be recycled or composted. A \$5 billion fund paid for by the plastics industry will be created. It will help restore and protect California's lands and waters from plastic pollution.

As Alexis Jackson, ocean policy and plastics lead of The Nature Conservancy says, "Other states are already looking forward to the law as a blueprint for what's possible. The plastic problem is the climate problem. This proves we can do something tangible." Let's all start by ditching disposables, especially single-use ones.

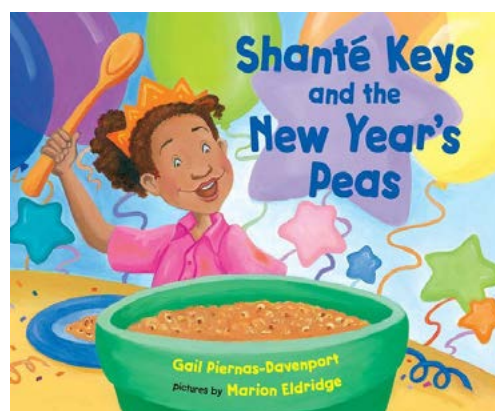

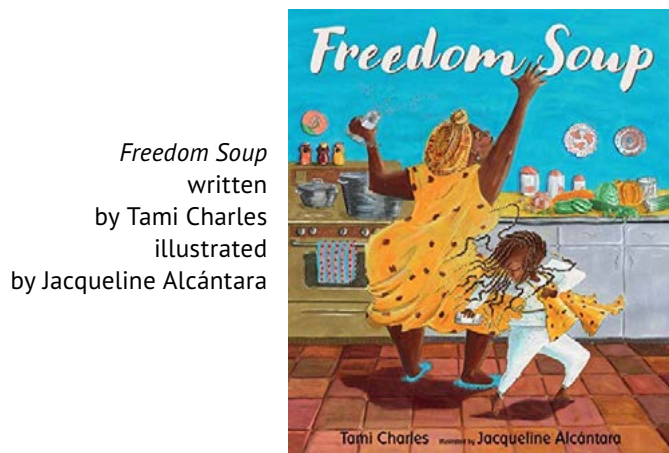

A More Just and Joyful World

As the end of 2022 approaches, many news outlets will be presenting stories of interest from the year just past. Among them will be narratives of war, crime, sickness, poverty, and the many other ills that plague humankind. There will also be stories of people triumphing against all odds to address these very conditions. Two of those organizations are here in our

local community: Upholding Humanity and the Manhasset/Great Neck Economic Opportunity Council (EOC).

Upholding Humanity is definitely the new kid on the block! It came into being in 2021 when a group of concerned members of different faith traditions gathered at the Islamic Center of Long Island (ICLI). Dr. Isma Chaudhry, Chair of the Board of ICLI convened the meeting for the purpose of discussing the willingness of the different faith communities to address the needs of refugees coming to Long Island. Those gathered agreed that they wanted to be part of the endeavor, and thus Upholding Humanity was born. Current members of the group are Temple Sinai of Roslyn, The Community Synagogue in Sands Point, the Social Justice Committee of UUCSR, St. John's Episcopal Church Cold Spring Harbor, the UJA Federation, and ICLI.

According to project coordinator Maddy Donath, since its inception, Upholding Humanity has assisted seven families to resettle in Queens and Nassau County, apply for benefits they are eligible for, find jobs, enroll their children in school, and learn their way around the community.

With the advent of colder weather, the organization is asking partner congregations to donate Visa gift cards in amounts from \$25 up to \$100. These cards will allow the families to purchase clothing and other items needed for the cold weather. If you would like to participate in this project, put the gift card in an envelope, label it Refugee Project, and drop it in one of the two donation boxes in the lobby. A second organization worthy of consideration is the Manhasset/Great Neck Economic Opportunity Council. Founded in 1966, it played a significant role in the Civil Rights struggle.

Today, the EOC serves as a multi-faceted resource for the people of Spinney Hill in Manhasset, plus Great Neck and Port Washington. Under its roof, there's a Head Start Program; Adventures in Learning, an after-school homework and enrichment program; a food pantry run by the Shelter Rock Church; activities for youth; and a summer camp experience for children in first- through eighth-grades. Volunteer tutors are also matched with students needing one-on-one attention.

But the scope of the EOC goes beyond the programs offered at the center. This story, shared by Stephanie Chenault, Executive Director of the EOC exemplifies this reach. "A single mother in Great Neck with four young girls was evicted from a house she had been renting for years when the owner dramatically raised the rent to force her out. The Head Start Family Service Worker was able to help them find temporary housing. She made arrangements with the school district to keep the older girls in their home schools, gave the family supermarket gift cards, and helped the mother complete applications for housing and SNAP (formerly food stamps)."

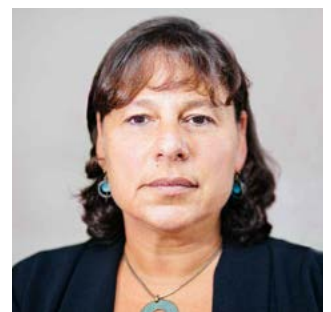

It Takes a Congregation—and Friends

It was supposed to be a glorious day of giving to children and mothers who are justice impacted—mothers reunited with or missing their children at holiday time. With the help of so many, it turned out that way—better than hoped.

We've done similar events before Covid. This year, we decided to do the cookie baking again. You may wonder why these women, these children. As Women's Issues Chair, I am always learning about and advocating for women. I found that the Vera Institute reported the number of women held in local jails and prisons has grown exponentially in the last several decades. Today, women in the US are incarcerated at over 10 times the level in 1970—from under 8,000 to nearly 110,000! The women have experienced trauma, have unmet mental and physical health needs, are single mothers, and come from low-income communities of color. The majority are charged with low-level offenses. When incarcerated, they are separated from their children and traumatized. After release, they try to reunite with their children. Our thinking was that cookie baking is something many of these children may have missed during holidays apart from their moms. I found two groups that work to help these women avoid prison, get jobs, and housing, and reunite with their children.

The first group, New Hour, is an organization dedicated to empowering justice-impacted women, mothers, and children. It provides a program called EMERGE, which stands for Empowering Methods for Effective Reentry, Growth, and Engagement.

Women's Opportunity and Rehabilitation Center is the second group I found that provides female offenders with the opportunity to pay their debts to society without being incarcerated. The WORC program is cost-effective, eliminating the expense of incarceration, the need for foster care placement of children, and public assistance.

Shelter Rock truly rose to the occasion with assistance from the Social Justice and Religious Education Committees. The Art Committee bought gifts for the children. A Hadley House resident donated many beautiful hand-knitted gifts. Volunteers came from the Congregational Church, and from a group funded by the Veatch Program, Prison Families Alliance. We had tables of crafts, a nature walk, lunch, and a visit from Santa with gifts for children.

All did not proceed without glitches. We had excitement in the kitchen. A member held back the spray of hot water while two volunteer boys from RE helped push the accumulating water into the floor drain. Even more amazing were two women guests who got on the floor with wrenches and stopped the water! They were triumphant and soaked to the skin. We remain very grateful.

The event left us feeling gratified and satisfied that we accomplished what we set out to do with so many volunteers and helpers. Thanks to all.
