TOUCHSTONES The Rev. Dr. Paul S. Johnson

As I write this on August 11, I have just four days left as Senior Minister at UUCSR. It has been quite an experience this last two weeks, dismantling my office, going through files from fourteen years at UUCSR and others which I have accumulated over 42 years of ministry. I have become reacquainted with people, places and causes, so it has been a poignant career review of joys, sorrows, challenges and triumphs. What a remarkable ride it has been!

A difficult chore has been packing thousands of books in my office and home, deciding which I would keep and which to discard. I ask myself, "Will I ever get around to reading or rereading this book?" Some books are like good friends. I have returned to them many times and can't bear to discard them at this point. I just have to hang on a bit longer.

I have to say again how grateful I am for the affirming send-off I have been given. The Retirement Gala on May 14 has to be one of the foremost experiences in my life, as was the luncheon given in my honor by the staff on August 4. I can see Carol and I pulling out the photos, video and memory book of the Gala from time to time over the years as a heartwarming reminder of our years here.

I'm pleased that Rev. Ned Wight will be your Interim Senior Minister. It has been a joy to work with him in his role as Executive Director of the Veatch Program for the past ten years. I hold him in the highest esteem. I know that he will provide excellent transitional leadership for you. The professional guidelines of our Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association, of which Ned and I are members, suggest that a departing minister and an incoming interim minister establish an agreement as to the relationship of the departing minister to the congregation during the interim.

I have assured Ned that I will not maintain any pastoral relationships within the Congregation during his interim ministry, will not conduct any rites of passage (child dedications, weddings, memorial services), and will not offer any administrative counsel.

Now this doesn't mean that when we see each other at General Assembly or some other denominational gathering that we have to ignore each other. We certainly can have a cordial relationship; it will just be a different one from what we now have. You are also welcome, of course, to visit the Stuart congregation. Several of you have said you would like to do so.

Many of you have expressed the hope that I will visit Shelter Rock in the future. I don't think that this would be advisable during this interim ministry or during the initial phase of a settled minister's tenure, but at some point down the line, I would certainly be open to and appreciate an invitation by your settled minister to visit. I was recently invited to visit and preach by the current Senior Minister of the Princeton congregation, which I previously served, and look forward to taking him up on the offer.

Now, here is a word about the future plans Carol and I have. In October, I will assume the position of Developmental Minister at the Treasure Coast Unitarian Universalist Society of Stuart, Florida, which is located 40 miles north of West Palm Beach on the Atlantic Coast. The contract is for a one-year term which may be renewed as many as three times. The Stuart congregation is entering an exciting time as they are about to occupy a new sanctuary seating 260 people. I also hope to be doing some volunteer work for the UUA in the area of legacy giving.

Carol will continue with her position as a clinical social worker with the V.A. at St. Albans, Queens until she retires at the end of the year and then we will have to get our home ready to put on the market in the spring. She will then join me in Florida and we will see if living there agrees with us. Our daughter Kristin who has been living with us while working in Manhattan will then be moving to Astoria, Queens, to share an apartment with a roommate from college.

Again, thank you for your support over the past fourteen years. I am grateful, as well, that you have named me as Minister Emeritus. I am proud to have my name associated with you on into the future.

I am very pleased to welcome Joan Minieri, who has accepted the position of Veatch Executive Director.

The Veatch ED Search Committee met over a period of approximately six months and conducted a nationwide search, led by our consultant, Mary Heidkamp. The Search Committee unanimously recommended Joan's candidacy to the Veatch Board of Governors and the Board of Trustees, which ratified our choice.

Joan brings to UUCSR nearly three decades of experience in the field of community organizing, including faith-based work. She holds a Master's degree from Columbia University School of Social Work. Most recently, Joan has been the National Program Director of Community Learning Partnership where she has developed academic/community partnership programs and curriculum for social change with community colleges throughout the country, and fostered opportunities for low-income and students of color to pursue careers in organizing, community development, policy advocacy and related fields, among other accomplishments.

Joan has long been familiar with the Veatch Program, since her former organization, Community Voices Heard, of which she is one of the co-founders, has been a long-standing Veatch Program grantee. She has served as Director of Communications for the National Religious Partnership for the Environment, where she advocated for environmental sustainability and justice with religious institutions and congregations, including Unitarian Universalists. She also served as Director of Community Development Services for Catholic Charities of New York. Joan has experience as a grant-maker when she coordinated the Catholic Bishops' Campaign for Human Development in the Archdiocese of New York. She also served as the Interim Executive Director of the Funders Collaborative for Youth Organizing.

Joan is the co-author of an award-winning book that is a widely used textbook, "Tools for Radical Democracy: How to Organize for Power in Your Community."

Joan has also taught at Columbia University School of Social Work and Robert F. Wagner Graduate School of Public Service, as well as at LaGuardia Community College.

Clean Up Fossil Fuels With Renewables

Strong regulations of existing oil and gas operations have been slow to evolve in the United States. As a result, we are stuck in the past, a past filled with dirty air and water. Unknown to many, the worst greenhouse culprit in the toxic fossil fuel pool, however, is methane. This has only been recently recognized as a villain, contributing massively to global warming via natural gas wells, chemically laced fracking and thousands of pipelines strewn throughout the United States. The fossil fuel industry has not always been transparent in their environmental practices, but this is changing because of the failure of a natural gas well on a California ranch.

Located in the community of the Porter Ranch, the site of a neverending methane leak emerged. This escaping methane disaster caused thousands of residents to flee and re-locate. The news spread nationally. It pointed out how urgently we are in need of enforceable rules to regulate our fossil fuel infrastructure. It showed us how our natural gas infrastructure is harmful and does not work well. In fact, enormous quantities of heat-trapping methane are released into our atmosphere and remain there longer than any other gas. In fact, methane traps 86 times more heat than carbon dioxide in the short run. These gas emissions blanket our earth (global warming).

Some states, like Colorado, are trying hard to fight the fossil fuel industry. They are adopting methane-control and leak detection device rules. But the EPA is watering down more effective rules by proposing regulations that apply only to new oil and gas operations. Even President Obama, who has opened up more land and water leases to fossil fuel development during his tenure than any other President, is finally listening to the message. There are eight million tons of methane released each year, which is believed to be having a detrimental impact on our climate.

On July 24, 2016, one day prior to the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia, The Clean Energy Revolution emerged. Thousands of people gathered to send a message. They came from different environmental groups or were grassroots supporters from across the nation calling for an end to fossil fuels. Carrying signs for clean energy and protesting government policies perceived as detrimental to our environment, they wanted immediate, palpable action, not promises. It is wind, solar, and geothermal energy that do not contribute to global warming or environmental disasters. Additionally, there are thousands of good jobs in renewables, and older industries would be revived if we transitioned from fossil fuels.

We all know renewable energy is constructive, not destructive to our planet. It is time for all of us to join in and demand we clean up fossil fuels and leave them in the ground. It is time to look at our government's policies and urge that changes take place to support a cleaner environment. Continued transition to renewable energy is one great way to save our lives and health and the earth we live on.

Defying Hate

It was January 1939. The previous year Hitler and his army had begun their march across Europe, annexing one country after another. While most Americans were unaware or chose to remain ignorant of these events, one group was following the situation carefully. American Unitarians, who had strong ties to the Unitarian community in Czechoslovakia, were concerned about the growing refugee crisis in that country. Already 250,000 Germans, fleeing Hitler's Reich, had come to Prague seeking refuge.

In light of this situation, American Unitarian Church leader, Rev. Everett Baker sought a Unitarian couple to undertake a mission to Czechoslovakia to assess the situation. They would bring back reports of what was needed to assist the thousands of Jews, dissidents, educators and cultural figures, and Czech political leaders who were opposed to Nazism and vulnerable to the spread of Hitler's reign of hatred and terror. Rev. Baker must have been an individual of exceptional patience and optimism. Rev. Waitstill Sharp and his wife Martha of Wellesley, MA were the 18th couple he contacted, and the first pair to say yes to this daunting mission!

Who were Waitstill and Martha Sharp? Why did they, out of all who were offered the opportunity to serve in this remarkable manner, say yes? After all, they too had reason to decline. Their two small children, Hastings, age 8, and Martha Content, age 3, certainly needed them. These are among the many questions that *Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War* seeks to answer. In both the PBS film by Ken Burns and Artemis Joukowsky, grandson of the Sharps, and the companion book by Mr. Joukowsky, we encounter two individuals of enormous integrity and courage as well as the frailties we all share.

This remarkable film will premiere on local PBS stations on Tuesday, September 20 at 9:00 p.m. As Unitarian Universalists we can be proud of this moment in our history. As members of UUCSR we can be gratified that we provided a Large Grant to promote this important film. We have much to celebrate!

Will you join other members of UUCSR and other local UU congregations to mark this occasion? On Tuesday, September 20 we will gather in the social hall for a pot luck supper (6:00 p.m.) and early showing of the film (7:00 p.m.), followed by reflections and sharing. So as not to miss the experience of the TV premier, we will tune in at 9:00 p.m. for the first few minutes of the broadcast. The members of the planning group for this event hope you'll join us on the evening of the 20th. If you can't come to the Congregation, we hope you'll invite neighbors to join you for your own home viewing.

This celebration on September 20 will be the first of a series of events during this congregational year as together we explore not only an important historical event, but themes that are relevant to our own times. We will consider the increase in hate speech and scapegoating of groups because of identity and religion, and war and poverty pushing millions of refugees to seek safety beyond their own national borders.

The Sharps made their commitment and saved the lives of many, many individuals. What will we do to stand up to hate, bigotry, and the scapegoating of others? Will you join Unitarian Universalists across the country as we seek to emulate the Sharps and make a difference in our own time?

75 Years

The fall of 1941 was a grim time for the western world. Fascism had engulfed much of Europe, and with it, dictatorship, persecution, suppression of dissent, notions of a master race, and the beginnings of the Holocaust. The war with the greatest death toll in human history was well under way. Anti-Semitism was rife internationally. Jim Crow was both the official and de facto law of this land.



In these fearful times, on the last Sunday of September, 1941, a small

group of people met in Port Washington to form a liberal religious community, devoted to principles such as free inquiry, human dignity, respect for human diversity, and democratic governance. With those ideas under siege around the world, these individuals were all the more determined to transmit such values to their children.

"We Started with the Children." That is the title of the late Robert Sunley's book, a history of this congregation from 1941-55. Our congregation began as a Sunday school for children. By the spring of 1943, the adults followed suit, with a four-part lecture series on various aspects of Unitarianism, repeated in the fall. By 1944, the first minister, Andrew Mahy, was called.

Three buildings, 26 ministers, and 36 congregational presidents later, this congregation is about to celebrate its 75th anniversary. We kick off our commemoration at our Homecoming picnic, where there will be a display table devoted to this congregation's heritage.

Many impressive and inspired actions and accomplishments are woven into the fabric of UUCSR's past. But it would be especially remiss not to mention the bequest of Carolyn Veatch, and the use of it in ensuing years. The yields of oil and natural gas from the land in Germany that Ms. Veatch bequeathed have resulted in grants totaling hundreds of millions of dollars, supporting workers' rights, women's rights, immigrant rights, and human rights, as well as extending assistance to people in desperate need as a result of natural disasters. Significant financial support has also been offered to the Unitarian Universalist movement. Our values could hardly have been more eloquently displayed than in this congregation's magnificent Veatch program.

The heart and soul of our history also resides in the people of this congregation... and their innumerable creative, devoted, generous-spirited efforts make the lives of other human beings happier, more stimulating, more rewarding, and more loving. Sometimes such efforts fall below the proverbial radar screen.

I want to offer a shout-out to Amalia DeePaolino, who is completing years of leadership with the George Kesner Memorial Used Book Exchange. As many of you know, this store has been a source of high quality books (and some other merchandise), at rock-bottom prices, and cumulatively, the proceeds have helped our Unitarian partner congregation in Csikszereda, Romania. So a heart-felt thank you, Amalia!

Another mark of good health in our 75th year is the continuing influx of new members, and I heartily welcome Margarita Gonzalez, and her delightful son, Yosef, and Peter and Carol Cannova and their equally delightful daughter, Angela. They will be introduced in the next Quest, but on behalf of us all, I'm delighted you're with us.

Look for "Lunch Bunch," two free theatrical field trips to the Planting Fields, and a trip to the Metropolitan, in particular the Egyptian exhibit, in other parts of this newsletter. And congratulations to Rev. Ned Wight, Interim Senior Minister of this congregation!


