The first time the ministry team announced that we would focus this congregational year on the theme, "Worth and dignity of all people," I was asked about why we were not including all life on the planet. Not just people, but all living things.

It reminded me that we can't see ourselves as isolated from the earth we live on. We are part of the natural world. This is not limited to the parts that are breathing

or moving, but includes the soil, rocks, water, and air. The whole planet is a living organism that depends on each other part. We thrive on the holistic interweaving of the living and inanimate aspects.

We have just celebrated Earth Justice month (March 22 through April 22) but that does not mean we are done. It is always a healthy practice to think about how we acknowledge the worth and dignity of each and every part of our planet.

There are seven Principles that Unitarian Universalists hold as ideals. The First Principle is: "The inherent worth and dignity of every person." The Seventh Principle is: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." It has been suggested that these two principles are the pillars of our faith, together they form the framing to hold up our beliefs and practices.

#### A Time of "Pentagon Papers Moments"



Rev. Ned Wight and I recently had the pleasure of presenting an event for the Adult Programs Committee together. On Thursday, April 12, 2018, we explored the role of the congregation and Veatch in funding the publication of the Pentagon Papers. With the film, The Post, reigniting interest in that defining time in our history, we spent the evening with about 25 members of the the congregation and community looking back at the late 60's/early 70's. Considering what was at

stake then, we reflected on the relevance today of this decisive act of Beacon Press and of the congregation to live into UU values, and not back down.

Daniel Ellsberg famously leaked the classified documents that became known as the *Pentagon Papers* to the news media in 1971, bringing to light a detailed account of U.S. decision making related to the Vietnam War. Later, Senator Mike Gravel, a UU from Alaska, engaged Beacon Press in publishing the full five-volumes of documents. Veatch and the congregation supported the Press with loans and grants, to ensure its stability and the distribution of the Pentagon Papers. #### **Relevance to Today**

Ned and I spoke to the past, and I gave examples of the ways that today's Veatch grantees are following in the footsteps of Beacon Press, who we still proudly fund, standing up to powerful forces of injustice. When Michael D'Innocenzo, Distinguished Professor Emeritus of History at Hofstra University, mentioned in the discussion that he was a good friend of my predecessor, Veatch founding director, Ed Lawrence, I went over to him afterwards and asked what kind of advice Ed would give to me today.

Mike's blog post:"Truth Matters for the Veatch Program,"<u>www.j.mp/veatch2</u> is his response to that question. Keep supporting people to speak the truth. Make sure the voices of justice and democracy remain strong, now more than ever.

I want to share a story with you of what this looks like. In March, the Veatch Board of Governors welcomed Andrea Dehlendorf,

Andrea greeted me with her deep appreciation. We were meeting for the first time and she wanted me to know how the Veatch Program was one of the founding funders who stood by OUR Walmart several years ago when the union that originally supported the effort to organize Walmart workers, changed its priorities. "We literally would not exist without the Veatch Program," she maintained.

Andrea introduced me to Donna, (not her real name) a Walmart worker from New Jersey, who the organization had trained to be a spokesperson and to organize her fellow workers.

It was Donna who shared a chilling story with us all about what it means for a Walmart worker to fight injustice at the nation's largest employer. She told us how she stood up to her manager when he refused to allow a fellow worker, a pregnant cashier, to step away from a long line when she began to experience a miscarriage—a situation that was exacerbated by the company's limited provision of bathroom breaks. The manager refused to take the cashier off the register, and insisted she keep checking out the long line of shoppers, despite her worsening condition.

Donna calmly described defying her manager, calling 911, taking over the line, and withstanding the formal reprimands that followed.

Speaking up, speaking out—it takes more than courage. As we saw in the publication of the Pentagon Papers, it takes a network of support and financial resources. I share this toward helping you hold and appreciate the impact of the long-term leadership development that Veatch supports, the importance of organizations that sustain strength in numbers, and the legacy we uphold in this time of Pentagon Papers moments.

#### The North Shore Soup Kitchen Comes of Age



Approximately 182,000 people will go hungry on Long Island tonight; 72,980 of those will be children. These numbers, from the Long Island organization, Community Solidarity, point to a glaring inconsistency. Despite its high standard of living and considerable wealth, Long Island is also home to poverty and hunger.

One organization that has

been rising to the challenge of addressing this need right here in northern Nassau County is the North Shore Soup Kitchen (NSSK). For 29 years, it has been serving nutritious meals to men, women, and children in an atmosphere of care, concern and respect. UUCSR supports NSSK through members who volunteer to serve meals and by raising money for its holiday meals.

Formerly known as the North Shore INN, this powerhouse of service to the local community recently decided, according to President Estelle Moore, that it was time to "become an independent, notfor-profit organization. While our mission remains the same, this new-found independence will give us the ability to nimbly meet the needs of those we serve even better than before." The only thing that has changed is the name.

The NSSK, the only such provider in Nassau County on the north shore of Long Island, will continue to serve 15,000 hot meals annually to hungry Long Islanders. It will continue to provide the services of a caseworker and of volunteer advocates who direct guests to needed resources. The NSSK will continue to be an organization that UUCSR will be proud to support.

That the NSSK could make this move says a lot about the mentoring that it received from the Interfaith Nutrition Network (INN). According to INN Executive Director, Jean Kelly, "Over many years, the INN's leadership helped create 21 soup kitchens across Nassau and Suffolk as mini-INNs, following the same guiding principles of offering dignity, respect and love, along with the daily meal. Many of the volunteers who are now leaders in each of the network soup kitchens came to realize that, over time, their soup kitchens have matured in both status and stature and are now able to become independent, non-profit soup kitchens. We are honored to have set a standard of commitment to those in need that all wish to follow." \*

Like all non-profit organizations, the NSSK needs to raise money to continue its work. That's why the Social Justice Committee, in collaboration with NSSK President Estelle Moore, and volunteer and UUCSR member, Beth Fedirko, along with a committee of NSSK volunteers is sponsoring a fundraiser on Thursday, May 31, 7:00 PM– 10:00 PM in the Art Gallery and Social Hall. For \$35 you will enjoy a savory lite supper catered by Elegant Affairs (wine, beer or soft drinks), music by the band, Alibi, and irresistible raffles, all the while supporting a good cause.

To make it convenient for you to reserve your ticket, volunteers will be in the Main Lobby after Worship on Sundays, May 1, 13, and 20. You can also make your reservation on line at <u>www.uucsr.org/soupkitchen</u>. Finally, you can pay by check. #### **WOMEN'S GROUP** Maria Ceraulo, Chair, Women's Issues

#### Eleven Cents in New York; Twenty Cents on Average in America



What kind of a difference could 11 cents, or 20 cents make in a person's life? What makes these numbers significant? Some might find it difficult to think it's even worth considering.

Each year, our Women's Group and the League of Women Voters observe Equal Pay Day—the day up to which the typical woman must work in a particular year to catch up with what thetypicalmaleearned.Thisyear,itwas

April 10. The League reminded us that it's more than 90 years since the first Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was introduced to guarantee women the same rights as men. In 2018, all these years later, the ERA still hasn't passed.

Today, in New York, women earn \$.89 to a man's \$1.00. In the United States, women earn an average of \$.80 to a man's \$1.00. When race is considered, black women are typically paid 63 cents and Latinas 54 cents compared to white men.

Lilly Ledbetter, in a *New York Times* op-ed piece, relates that pay discrimination isn't just about pay, it's about power. It was true in 1980s, 1990s, and today. On the road, Lilly hears from many women. They don't just tell about how their male coworkers doing the same job are making more. They tell about lost jobs, demotions, stagnating because of sexual harassment or because they reported it.

Although it may seem like just a few cents, the National Partnership for Women and Families estimates that nearly \$900 billion is lost to women every year. Why should we care? We should care because mothers are breadwinners for half of the families with children under 18. Twenty-seven percent of these women have incomes below the poverty level.

Even more women and their families will go hungry if the new farm bill succeeds in implementing devastating cuts to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Women who are being underpaid and who struggle the most will now suffer more. Older women who are more likely to have incomes below the poverty line, survivors of domestic violence, and mothers of children under 18, will be devastated. According to the National Women's Law Center, the farm bill is a savage attack on women who cannot afford to put food on the table for their families.

It seems like 11 cents or 20 cents is a very small amount, particularly to those living comfortably with enormous tax reductions and bonuses. How can we pay for these windfalls for the wealthy? For a woman living near or below the poverty line, it can mean staying in an abusive relationship, putting up with harassment at work, hardship and hunger for herself and her children. If the gap were eliminated, many things could be paid for—not extras by any means. They could be: 14 months of child care, 74 weeks of food, 7 months of mortgage and utilities payments, 10 months rent, 8.7 years of birth control.

Despite the Equal Pay Act of 1963, there are warnings that women will not reach parity until 2059. With the proposals in the new farm bill, one wonders if it will ever happen. How can we help? The National Partnership for Women and Families suggests that we support some federal policy solutions: Paycheck Fairness Act, Fair Pay Act, the Raise the Wage Act, Healthy Families Act, Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act, full funding for federal agencies that investigate and enforce fair pay, comprehensive reproductive health care.

We urge you to contact your members of congress and be sure to vote.

HADLEY HOUSE HAPPENINGS Hadley House Residents' Council

When You See Something—DO SOMETHING! Living Our UU Principles Written by Lilyan Strassman

"Jo" Solomon, one of our magical residents at Hadley House, responded to the Rev. Ned's requests for Times Remembered in the days of Martin Luther King. Ned was visiting Hadley House residents one afternoon recently.

"It was 'Spring Break' at school" Jo began, "and my husband and I decided to take the children to Florida. My daughter was in Kindergarten, my son in 3rd grade and



we had the baby in diapers! We didn't know how she would take the trip, but we were willing to find out."

Jo said the trip down to Florida was flawless...They drank from Ponce de' Leon's Fountain of Youth and did fun things for the children. On the way back, they hit traffic that was so discouraging, her husband decided to take side roads. They found themselves going through unplowed fields along small dirt roads that eventually led them to a clearing. There before them was a beautiful little school in the middle of nowhere. They were met by the Principal of this all black segregated school, with tears in his eyes. "I guess they never expected to receive guests at their school...certainly not white guests! We were invited in and shown around, to the delight of all the children, students and guests alike. The principal told us, sadly, that their school couldn't be accredited because it didn't have a library. Without accreditation, the children could not go to an accredited High School."

BAM! Another way to prevent the education of African American children. "We were stunned. After a brief conversation and exchange of information, they all most graciously gathered and waved goodbye."

Once in the car, the kids asked what "accreditation" meant. We explained that it meant, without it, the children could not go to a good High School. The children were so upset, they said, "Lets send them lots of books! I've got too many...and I'll ask all the kids at the Unitarian Church!" (The original Unitarian Church in Port Washington, where the Rev. Hadley was presiding.)

And so it went. Between books collected by the adults in the family and their son's and daughter's enthusiasm for some sort of "fairness" for the "black children in Battleburrough, North Carolina, they sent ship loads of books to help those folks build their Library and get accredited. A plaque sits outside the school house.

Thanks to the Solomon Family. And thanks to you Jo for keeping alive this remarkable story. It remains an example the finest qualities of our Unitarian Universalist Principles in Action.

#### The Journey of Rewilding

What is rewilding? It is "the kind of freedom embodied by the spirit of the horse." It is the restoration of life giving ways and nature in balance as it was originally intended. In Europe it is already a continental initiative. It is done under the auspices of the CANA Foundation.

For Europeans, rewilding is being done by people interested in working to assist the wild horse. Their view is that these wild horses are very important gene sources in spite of domestication. In fact, with the absence of strong human selection and natural selection, these original breeds remain strong and fit for a natural wild life. They have been doing genetic studies of wild horses in order to determine which horse breeds are closest to originals. This can further their goal of back-breeding. Their wild horses will be placed into ecosystems offering them new areas for expansion. At least, five herds of 100 animals will be established in rewilding areas before 2022. These are abandoned lands that are not being put to use for any other purpose. One important reason for this European support is to develop business around the return of the wild horse linking wildlife conservation with local economic benefits. European rewilding offers new opportunities for bringing back and developing an economy based more on wildlife and nature as well.

But what has happened and is happening to our wild horses in the United States is a national disgrace. There are over 80,000 wild horses kept in holding pens just like cramped refugees in a camp. They have been put there by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) because of business interests. A land grab, which covers over twelve Western states due to agribusiness, oil fracking and drilling interests, has invaded our public lands, and we and the horses are paying the price. It costs taxpayers over \$100 million dollars to keep them in these penned prisons until they are brought to the slaughter for meat or other products. So much for the Wild West and our notion of the symbol of cherished free horses! How can we who care about wild horses protect them?

Manda Kilimian is founder of the CANA Foundation on Long Island. She has started a non-profit here that advocates for and works to rewild our horses, habitats, and humanity. The CANA Foundation is also implementing several preliminary projects. One important pilot project is currently being spearheaded by Moses Brings Plenty. He is an artist, activist, and CANA foundation ambassador. To stop the controversial "overpopulation" of wild horses, he is seeking to rescue them from the BLM holding facilities by placing them on land granted in America's reservations. To rehome them on Native American lands, away from the BLM's facilities, they can be freed and released to roam and live in these protected habitats. Another safe place is the Southwest Center for Horses, Humans and Healing. It was founded by Gino and Molly Antonio at their traditional family home site on the Dine (Navajo) Nation in Window Rock, Arizona."

These rewilding initiatives simultaneously provide sustainability projects to the communities that welcome them home. Native Americans know how connected their environment and culture is to

the welfare of horses. They have been integral to their survival and lifestyle, bringing economic benefits to these communities as well. However, rewilding of horses is not an easy fix in the United States. Most people are far removed from nature and the creatures that live in various habitats. But Native Americans are not. They know we must live in balance with nature to sustain it. This means that non-native Americans must understand the notion of cohabitation with other species such as wild horses. This means we need to push back at what is happening to our wild horses and learn how our landscape and public lands are being desecrated. If we do not save these wild horses, one of the most notable icons of American history, then more imbalance will result. Let us start by calling attention to the plight of the wild horses. Let us stop land grabs. Maybe we all need a rewilding- going back to the basics of sustaining nature. To start, donate to the CANA Foundation at www.canafoundation.org and call your representatives.
