Duke Ellington composed a series of Sacred Concerts performed in major churches all over the US. The concerts were improvisatory in nature and no complete score of it exists.


Two composers, Peder Pedersen and John Hoybye, recreated a scored version which will be performed here on April 14, 2019.

# TOUCHSTONES

Many years ago, while on vacation and overcome by the beauty of the lush plant life where Rich and I were staying, I purchased a new plant for our home—a variegated peperomia, or so the little plastic sign in the soil told me. The shopkeeper at the nursery where I purchased it said, "it prefers less water." And I thought, "Oh yeah, I can manage to NOT water a plant. Caring for this plant is going to be

easy!" But it wasn't nearly as easy as I'd imagined.

No matter what I did over the years that that plant and I lived together—giving it lots of light, giving it less light, watering regularly, watering irregularly, feeding it "miracle grow" or just tap water—that darn plant always looked near death's door. So much so that I began to regard it as a constant reminder of the things in life over which I have no control.

One day, I propped up some of its tendrils with toothpicks to improve its appearance—if not its health—and to ease my sense that I had a brown thumb instead of a green one. Not long after, Rich and I went away on a vacation.

I returned to find a glorious happening in my variegated peperomia's pot: new shoots were growing out of the soil! (My inlaws apparently had the key to this plant's health) and so I began a regular routine of watching its growth, watering it more carefully, and turning it each day so it would receive more even sunlight.

Then I noticed that instead of having sort of spade-shaped leaves, the leaves on this new growth were clover-shaped...there was a weed growing in my house plant.

I was heartbroken. The clover-leafed thing grew like wildfire too! Everyday I stared at its growth trying to decide what to do. Here was this plant that I had been trying, desperately, to help thrive and which I had barely kept alive. Now there was something growing fast and furiously...but it wasn't what I wanted. Finally, I had to laugh at the irony of this plant's life-lessons; that often we

# Music Sunday 2019 Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert April 14, 11:00 AM

At the age of 66 and at the height of his career, Duke Ellington composed a series of concerts planned in major churches all over the US. He was inspired by the fact that his dear friend and collaborator, Billy Strayhorn, was very ill. We don't find religious or spiritual references in Ellington's earlier works, but Strayhorn's illness shook Ellington deeply. Strayhorn died soon after the premier of the first Sacred Concert, and over the next several years Ellington toured his three Sacred Concerts. The first was premiered at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco (1965), the second at The Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York (1968), and the third at Westminster Abbey in London (1973). Improvisatory in nature, and adapted to the resources available at each location, no complete score of the three Sacred Concerts exists because each performance varied greatly one from the other. In 1993, as a result of an international conference based solely on the Sacred Concerts, two composers, Peder Pedersen and John Hoybye, created a scored version recreating selections from each of the three Sacred Concerts. It is this version which will be our featured Music Sunday work this year.

The UU Congregation's expanded choir of approximately 60 singers will be joined by a "Big Band" of 17 players and vocal soloists Lilyan Strassman, Meagan Brus, Leah Wood, Joshua Sanders, and Brace Negron.

This work is rarely heard and you are encouraged to invite your friends and family to this wonderful musical event. The service will run approximately one hour and twenty minutes due to the length of the piece.

Referring to the Sacred Concerts, Ellington characterized them as the most important thing I have ever done.

# **VEATCH NEWS**

On Friday, March 22, Saru Jayaraman, Co-Founder of Restaurant Opportunities Center (ROC) United, joined the Veatch Program Board of Governors and members of the congregation for their March Policy Retreat celebrating Women's History Month. ROC United was initially founded in New York City after September 11, 2001, to provide support to the more than 13,000 restaurant workers displaced as a result of the World Trade Center tragedy. ROC has grown into a national restaurant workers' organization with 32,000 worker members, and more than 700 employer partners who are organizing their peers to help transform the industry. ROC is one of the nation's leaders in the fight for a fair wage and a harassment-free workplace in the food-service industry.

In her presentation to us, Saru described the restaurant industry as rife with sexual harassment and exploitation. She compared the industry, that employs 14 million people in the US, as a training ground for how women expect to be treated in any job they obtain. Women workers make up the majority of the industry and rely on tips to make ends meet in an increasingly unjust economy. Women are encouraged to dress a certain way or put up with customers to make sure they get their tips. Saru believes that if we can transform this industry, it will be because of women's leadership. She highlighted how the #TimesUp movement has increased the visibility of harassment in the restaurant industry, among other labor sectors, and how ROC's engagement in its One Fair Wage! campaign could help address the issue of harassment of restaurant workers by eliminating workers' reliance on tips to make a living wage.

In addition to improving wages and benefits for restaurant workers, ROC United is educating restaurant workers as voters who have the potential to turn out to the polls to vote for state-based increases in the tipped wage. ROC believes restaurant workers can play a crucial role in securing our democracy in critical states. Saru updated us on efforts in New York, and left the group with several action steps:

- 1. Download the ROC Diner's Guide app to select establishments who pay their workers a fair wage and offer paid time off;
- 2. Refer workers to join ROC to become more aware of their rights;
- 3. Encourage your favorite restaurants to connect with ROC and become a high road employer;
- 4. Contact local government officials to encourage support to raise the minimum wage for tipped workers in NY State.

Saru noted that Veatch was one of ROC United's early funders and that our long-term support has made it possible for ROC to become a national force for building worker power. She thanked the congregation for its continued steadfast support.

# **Beloved Conversations, Part II**



In December, I wrote about the anti-racism program, Beloved Conversations that was being held in UU congregations across Long Island. The eight-session program came to an end last week.

In the last few sessions of the program we examined what we were already doing to address racism and then we shared our dreams for being congregations rooted in racial justice.

Prominent among our "dreams" was the desire to be allies to communities of color. Many of us white people who are aware of and concerned about the effects of systemic racism on communities of color do want to be allies. Often, we just don't know where or how to start.

During Beloved Conversations we were encouraged to invite people of color who lead communities of color to speak with us and tell us what it was like to have white people come to be allies and "to help." We learned that when we white people show up, it must be with an attitude of humility and a willingness to listen and learn from the community.

I have kept in touch with the leaders who shared that evening with us. One of them, Mimi Pierre-Johnson has told me of the immediate need of her Haitian community in Elmont. They want a community center where they can gather and provide services for the community, and not just the Haitian community, but anyone in Elmont. After months of searching, Mimi has found a venue that would be prefect, but she needs to raise \$250,000 to have rent and operating expenses for at least a year.

# A Visit to Sisters of St. Joseph and a Lesson in Sustainable Land Management



A delegation of eight congregants traveled to Brentwood, NY on a blustery, cold Saturday in March to visit with the Sisters of St. Joseph. The Order with 400 members has become well known as a model of a faith-

based community engaging in ethical land management that has reverence for all the wonders of creation. Rev. Ned Wight in his sermon on October 14, 2018, challenged UUCSR to emulate the Sisters who have undertaken many green projects on their 212-acre property.

Inspired by Rev. Ned's sermon, the delegation of congregants from the Building and Grounds and Green Sanctuary Committees met with Sister Karen Burke, Coordinator of Land Initiatives, and Sister Clara Santoro, Past President. Sister Karen passionately explained the Land Ethic statement, adopted by her faith-based community, which is a credo guiding all decisions regarding their land. The statement commits the Sisters "to preserve, protect, restore, and

cherish the integrity, biodiversity, balance, and beauty of the land and all the species with whom we share it."

The achievements of the Sisters in environmentally sound land management have been very impressive. They have installed a complex of solar panels which supply 63 percent of the energy needs of their campus. With a grant from the Long Island Community Foundation, they have developed a rain garden which captures stormwater and allows it to infiltrate into a vegetative area. They have converted

a large part of their lawn into a wildflower meadow which has been a haven for pollinators and other insects of all kinds. They have sold conservation easements to the County and State to preserve the open space on their property in perpetuity. Finally, the Sisters have obtained grants from Suffolk County and the Pritchard Foundation to replace their outmoded on-site sanitary waste disposal system with an innovative constructed wetland system.

The discussion with Sister Karen and the tour of the property was very inspirational for the eight congregants who attended, sparking ideas for how we can manage our property. Those who attended were: Jim and Elaine Peters, Kathy de Vos, Ellen Councill, Stephen Ruocco, Rebecca Smith, Jim Ansel, and Dana Gumb. Sister Karen and Sister Clara invited us to return later in the year when all the vegetation on their beautiful campus will be in full splendor.


# A Wildflower Garden for Earth Day

On Friday, March 8, landscape ecologist Rusty Schmidt and his research assistant Ashley Crespo visited the UUCSR campus to talk about the designing of a wildflower garden. Rusty has been working with David Jakim from REWILD.



This is an organization that has been planting areas throughout the Town of North Hempstead through another branch organization called the Port Washington Monarch Alliance. They are dedicated to planting native wildflower gardens across Long Island.

Wildflowers are everywhere we allow them. They are not only beautiful and colorful to humans, but also those that are native to Long Island are food and habitat for birds and bugs (which themselves are food for birds and other animals). All contribute to make a healthy soil and ecosystem. Long Island's native wildflowers include an amazing array of larger trees and shrubs, such as black cherry and northern bayberry, as well as golden rod and golden aster plus grasses such as big and little bluestem and switch grass.





What the Green Sanctuary Committee and Building and Grounds Committee would like to do is plant a wildflower garden on our premises. It would be small and pretty and easily accessible. We have the space and our walk through with David and Rusty helped us find the right area and design for this project. What a great gift to celebrate Earth Day if we begin this year. We hope you support our plans to enhance and green UUCSR more than ever before. Of course, these kinds of gardens can also be planted at your home. They can not only beautify a monotonous suburban landscape, but also greatly benefit our diminishing good insect population and help the soil and water in this time of climate disturbance. # **Small Great Things**



We have another novel in stock at our UUCSR Bookstore: *Small Great Things by Jodi Picoult*. Although it is an imaginary tale, the issues in it are real. Jodi Picoult is a talented author who has written 25 books and has long wanted to write about racism. However, being white and privileged, she felt she could not know or describe what it is like growing up black. She solved her creative dilemma by writing to her own community— white people, who can easily point to a neo-Nazi skinhead and say he is a racist but don't recognize their own prejudices. Picoult is skilled at contrasting different points of view and her sharply-honed writing ability produces a book that moves quickly and is a bit of a pageturner.

The story is told from three points of view: Ruth's, Turk's, and Kennedy's. Ruth is an experienced black nurse in an infant pediatric ward. She is ordered not to touch a baby whose parents, Turk and Brittany Bauer, are white supremacists. They demand that Ruth not be allowed to care for their son. The next day when she is alone on the ward and the baby goes into cardiac arrest, she makes the difficult decision to intervene and performs CPR. When the baby dies, the grieving and angry parents believe Ruth is at fault and she is charged with its death. Kennedy McQuarrie, a white woman, is the public defender and must defend Ruth of these serious charges. Picoult uses the lawyer to represent someone like herself, a well-educated liberal who struggles with her own denial and unawareness of latent racism. Ruth, in turn, becomes aware of the many small aggressions she tried so hard to repress: the woman who moves her purse when she comes near, the patient who thinks she is part of the cleaning staff, the acquaintance who guestions her son's school success. Turk's loathsome beliefs are explored and explained in terms of his background and his trauma; the author manages to make him flawed but human.



This is soon to be a major motion picture starring Julia Roberts and Viola Davis.
