Homecoming Sunday and Membership Renewal

September 15 is Homecoming Sunday and marks the unofficial beginning of the Congregational Year. The Homecoming Sunday Service and the Picnic that follows provides the opportunity to reacquaint ourselves with friends whom we often have not seen since the Spring. It is also the time to make new friends and acquaintances, including our new

Developmental Minister, Jaye Brooks.

It is also the time to reacquaint ourselves with the Financial Development Committee. This is the committee that probably is the least appreciated and has the most thankless task in the Congregation. It is charged with conducting the Annual Pledge. This year the Committee hopes to be able to complete the most frustrating part of its work during the 3 1/2 months between Homecoming Sunday and the end of the calendar year, and it will need everyone's cooperation to accomplish this. For the remainder of this calendar year, FDC wants to modify its focus by asking all current members to assess simply whether UUCSR is important in their lives, and not attempt to quantify that importance. If UUCSR is important to you, then I am hoping that you will take the time to renew your membership without having to be tracked down and asked by a member of FDC. This means completing a confidential pledge form, submitting it to the Finance Office, and making an initial payment towards the amount you have pledged.

And now for something (I hope) unexpected. Unlike what has happened in other years, I am not going to try to convince you in this brief column to increase the amount of your pledge. (On the other hand, I hope you won't use this column to justify reducing it either.) What I am trying to convince you is that if UUCSR is important to you, you will take the time to renew your membership regardless of the amount you decide to pledge now. You can always increase your pledge later this year, if you are moved to do so.

More significantly, there are a number of members who have listened carefully to last year's budget discussions, and I am convinced that before the end of November, they will provide a powerful reason for you to increase your pledge.

Recognizing Those Fighting for Worker Rights



Over Labor Day weekend, many of us enjoyed some much-needed down time. At Veatch, we spent time this summer doing early planning for some of our annual events, such as Veatch Sunday in January. We will be inviting grantees from throughout the country to our meetings and events at various points in the congregational year. I look forward to sharing more information with you about these

opportunities for congregation members to meet and learn with our amazing grantees.

Labor Day is more than a last chance at summer vacation before the cool weather sets in. It's also a day to recognize the contributions of workers. Veatch grantees honor and galvanize the power of workers every day through their campaigns for economic justice. Here are just some of their recent accomplishments to keep workers healthy, respected and engaged:

- Healthy After passing a ballot measure to expand Medicaid coverage in 2018, Nebraska Appleseed launched a new effort to ensure 94,000 eligible low-income workers receive their benefits as quickly as possible.
- Respected The Coalition of Immokalee Workers continues to work with student groups across the country to pressure Wendy's into joining its Fair Food Program a commitment to working with growers with good labor practices. The Social Justice



Committee and the Veatch Program have long supported this groundbreaking effort. I was thrilled to learn that the food cooperative where I shop locally joined the Fair Food Program this summer, demonstrating its wide diversity and reach.

• Engaged More than a year before the 2020 elections, the National Black Worker Center Project began canvassing voters in Raleigh. The group will release a report early next year with policies to support low-income black workers.

These are urgent times. We are keeping this inspiring work for justice in mind as we get back to our own work following the Labor Day break.

The Unitarian Universalist Veatch Program at Shelter Rock provides support for efforts within the religious and spiritual mission of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock where their purposes are best served by outside agencies acting under the Veatch Program and the Congregation.



For those seeking a new form of centering and exercise, and for those who have found Soulful Sundown a meaningful addition to their spiritual practice, UUCSR is offering a new ministry: Soulful Salutations.

Led by long-time yoga instructors Denise DeLuca and Ben Wisch (Soulful Sundown's keyboard player), Soulful Salutations is a gentle yoga practice combined with music.

"How do you welcome congregants back after summer?"

Historically, many Unitarian Universalist congregations recognize the end of summer with a celebration of Homecoming or Ingathering in September. This is a time when friends return from their summer travels, and we renew our connectedness.

Our congregation comes together in worship and begins religious education classes for children and youth. We also have a big picnic for everyone outside on the lawn. The air is filled with bubbles and grill smoke, music and storytelling.

Many Unitarian Universalist congregations have a ritual at Homecoming or Ingathering called Water Ceremony. During the ceremony, sometimes called the Water Communion, people bring to the worship service a small amount of water from a place that is meaningful to them, and pour their water together into a large bowl. As water flows from many sources, it is all life-giving.

Our combined water is symbolic of our shared faith coming from different sources and being life affirming. The water is blessed by the congregation and is sometimes boiled and used as the "holy water" in child dedications and other ceremonies. Often a small amount of water from one year is added to the water from the next as a symbol of our connectedness across time.

It's Alive!

This year at General Assembly, a resolution was passed to modernize the wording of the second of the six sources from which we cultivate the living tradition of Unitarian Universalism. The second source used to read "Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice,

compassion, and the transforming power of love" and the updated language now says, "Words and deeds of prophetic people..." This is a great step towards inclusion of all gender identities, and this beacon that now shines on this source in particular is a call to action for Unitarian Universalists everywhere.

The wonderful thing about being part of a living faith tradition is that we don't have to rely solely on words from sacred texts and their interpreters for spiritual inspiration. A living tradition is just that. It lives. It breathes. It grows. We are free to draw words of wisdom from all of history to present day. Religious Education Program participants may have noticed that the quotes from great thinkers found in the weekly RE e-mail range from Socrates to film actor Danny Trejo. Gathering ideology from established sources is valuable but also easy. Being open to receiving inspiration from a pop song or from the person sitting in the pew next to you, therein lies the stuff that keeps Unitarian Universalism expanding and breathing.

The theme for this year in Religious Education is Awareness of and Engagement with Our Environment. Not just what we tend to think of as The Environment in terms of climate change (although that will be part of our exploration), but also an awareness of Our Environment. Who are all these amazing people in community with us? What's going on all around this incredible building? What wonders are to be found across the grounds and in the woods? To achieve this, our children, youth and adults will practice noticing and mindfulness. We must be mindful of who and where we are before going out to embody the change we wish to see in the world.

Mindfulness, after all, Leads to kindfulness.

Mary Oliver, a favorite poet of mine, once said, "Attention is the beginning of devotion." When we return to community on Homecoming Sunday, September 15, let us notice one another. Who's taller? Whose hair is now purple? To whom have we never spoken? Notice and connect. Keep noticing and connecting. All of us, together, make Unitarian Universalism come alive.

What will you do to address climate change?

Most people who travel from England to the United States fly. Greta Thunberg is definitely not "most people." The 16 year-old climate activist from Sweden, who will be attending the UN General Assembly Sessions in NYC in September, has renounced air travel because of its

enormous carbon foot print. Instead, she made a zero-emissions, 15-day voyage across the Atlantic in the solar powered yacht, the Maliza II.

For the last year, Greta has been the youthful face of action to address climate change. Her activism started when she was 11 as a result of what she was learning in school about the degradation of the earth. So touched was she that she fell into a depression and stopped eating and speaking. It was only when she began to realize that she could take action to address this issue that the depression lifted, and she started speaking out. A year ago, she started a strike from school, sitting every Friday outside the Swedish Parliament Building with a sign that read: "School Strike for the Climate."

Greta has Asperger's syndrome, a condition that she calls a gift. She speaks directly, dispensing with the rhetoric that often hides the urgency of our global crisis. She's all over YouTube, but this video of her TED Talk is especially good: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=EAmmUIEsN9A

Greta is here in NYC, having arrived on August 28, to remind us all that we are facing a global crisis. She will not be alone. On September 20, three days before the UN Climate Summit in NYC, young people and adults will strike all across the US and the world to demand transformative action be taken to address the climate crisis. The Deceptive Plastics Industry

The United States is the world's largest polluter of plastics. More than 8.3 billion metric tons of plastic produced (79 percent) has ended up in landfills or scattered globally. We recycle only 1 percent of our plastic bags. This situation has become a deadly problem for our environment and every living thing on our planet. Currently, the public has begun to learn how recycling rules are changing; the plastic industry has also. In their interest, they are applying a green veneer to appease the public.

The plastic industry is good at suppressing meaningful efforts to wean the public off their products. In Tennessee a contest sponsored by A Bag's Life encouraged kids to clean up plastic waste. At the same time, the American Progressive Bag Alliance, a lobby group that fights restrictions on plastics, changed a law there; it became illegal for local governments to ban or restrict plastic bags, including single-use products. Its members of the Plastic Industry Association, (Shell Polymers, Exxon Mobil, Chevron Phillips, Dow DuPont and Novolex), cheered.

The reality is that plastic recycling and proper disposal is dead. Why? Many plastics do not decompose and are not reusable. Plastic toys, single-use clamshells, bottles, bags, straws, chip bags, toiletry tubes, electronics and lids, must be burned or buried. If incinerated, they produce air and water pollution, especially affecting lower income communities. Since China no longer accepts our plastic trash, we are sending it to other countries: Turkey, Senegal, Thailand, India, Indonesia. Mismanaged there, this plastic trash is burned or illegally dumped.

Sadly, the plastic industry's lobbying cover-ups include introducing new chemicals into more plastic items. Lower oil and gas prices, have meant more than 700 new plastic products implemented. The winners, raking in billions of dollars, are companies and corporations associated with plastic production. Taxes, fees, and bans are necessary like Canada did on plastic bags and single-use plastic products. In the US, this approach has been thwarted.

Our plastic trash problem won't disappear overnight, nor will unnecessary plastic usage. We must change our habits, use glass or metal bottles, paper straws and reusable bags, and implement better recycling regulations. Finally, we must expose the plastic industry's duplicity, so companies invest in non-plastic replacements.
