# CONGREGATIONAL AFFAIRS Adam Barshak, Congregation Operations Administrator



I want to welcome members to the 2019–2020 congregation year after the summer hiatus. As you may be aware, the congregation approved a significant capital improvement budget for the current year after two years of reduced spending. Some projects have been completed, while others are either in progress or in the planning stages for a fall launch. Below is a capital projects update:

### **COMPLETED**

- Work was completed on the Veatch House courtyard during the summer; the bluestone slates were replaced with concrete pavers and polymeric sand was placed between the courtyard blocks. The concrete pavers are not prone to chipping and lifting as the large bluestone slates were, and the polymeric sand forms a hardened surface between the courtyard blocks, providing an improved walking surface. It is expected that similar pavers will replace the remaining bluestone throughout the property as part of capital expenditures in future years.
- With the desire to reduce the use of plastic, reusable water bottles are becoming more common. To support their use, five new "bottler-filler" water fountains were added to the main building including one on the lower level, one outside of the Teachers Resource Center, and three in the RE wing.

### IN PROGRESS

- UUCSR Music Director Stephen Michael Smith has been receiving many questions regarding the status of the Worship Room organ. Please see his update on the following page.
- An architect has been engaged to help the congregation identify ways in which it can manage the property in an environmentally ethically way. Nelson & Pope is working with a joint group of members from the Buildings and Grounds and Green Sanctuary committees in this capacity. These groups will be engaging the congregation on this project over the next few months on an ethical, land-management statement and capital projects that can be considered over the next few years.
- The Member Resource Room is being redesigned to include a total of computers and 7 telephones.
- To enhance communication throughout both the main building and Veatch House, the installation of a public address system is underway. The system is expected to be online in October.

### **PLANNED**

There are several projects that will begin later this fall including:

- replacement of the main building's lower level carpeting,
- removal of the main lot, diseased pear trees and replacement with diverse plantings,
- finalization of the Veatch House roof upgrade with work performed on the east-facing roof over the courtyard, and
- an overhaul of the RE wing roof to stem an increasing amount of leaks that have occurred over the last few years.

I would like to thank Adrian Rivera, Director of Facilities, for shepherding these projects forward. Adrian and I will keep the members informed as these projects move forward.

### **UPDATE:** What is Happening with Our Pipe Organ?

Described by some as a "toothless grin," many of you have noticed that something is happening to our Jaeckel mechanical-action pipe organ in the front of the Worship Room.

The sound that you hear when a pipe organ is played is created by wind rushing through (in some cases) cylindrical tubes or "pipes." The pipes which you see when you look at the front of the organ produce some of the lowest-sounding pitches in the instrument. These particular pipes are made from an alloy of lead and tin, with trace amounts of antimony and copper. The percentage of each metal in the alloy influences the characteristic sound of the resulting pipe.

The design of our neo-baroque instrument called for a particular type of sound and, therefore, a particular mix of metals was used at the time of its construction. Unfortunately, the alloy in some of the pipes was not rigid enough to withstand the test of time, and a good number of the pipes started to collapse. These pipes no longer "spoke," and they started to present a safety problem as they could have failed structurally to the point where they could fall out of the organ case and cause an injury.

An organ builder has been engaged to build new pipes with a stronger alloy mix to replace the failing pipes. We anticipate our organ will be fully operational and ready to make glorious music in time for our Messiah Sing on Sunday, December 8.

### Membership Renewal, Part 2

In the last edition of *The Quest*, I wrote about the work of the Financial Development Committee (FDC) to conduct the Annual Pledge Drive. I asked everyone to cooperate with FDC and for all members to renew their membership as quickly as possible, and certainly prior to December 31. I also suggested, although some have indicated that this bordered on heresy, that for the

time being and until you are given a good reason to pledge more, your focus should be simply on renewing your membership.

In this column I hope to provide some context for this. First, however, I am asking that you put aside the warning popularized by Mark Twain regarding statistics. Second, I want to thank Sue Kimler in the Finance Office who put together the chart below.

There is nothing terribly mysterious or surprising about the data arrayed in this chart. However, I have discovered that the there are at least three different interpretations: Pessimistic, Optimistic, and Pragmatic.

The Pessimistic Interpretation reads each row individually starting on the left, and sees significant declines in membership each year.

The Optimistic Interpretation traverses the chart the way a Knight moves on a chessboard starting each move from the upper right and moving one space down and two spaces to the left. The Optimist acknowledges the declines in membership but responds that they are attributable mostly to the fact that a significant number of memberships "lapse" overnight each year between December 31 and January 1. Fortunately, most, if not all, of these "lapsed" members appear to be reinstated by the following June.

The Pragmatists (and I count myself in this group) read each column from the top to bottom. They see a slow and steady decline in membership, whether one looks at each June 30, December 31, or January 1. I believe this decline is also reflected in other aspects of life at Shelter Rock. I see the issue of "lapsed" members, but I don't think that is the real issue or an insoluble problem. There has got to be a way to address our collective inability to complete a membership renewal form, make a pledge, and make a payment towards that pledge commitment prior to December 31 each year.

Is it because we can't find the time to complete the membership renewal form; perhaps we aren't convinced that we should contribute to an organization that has the financial resources with which we have been blessed. Or is it just possible that we don't know as a community what we should do or what we should expect from ourselves and our fellow members.

For over 40 years (far longer than I have been a member), we did not need member contributions in order to fulfill our needs and desires. The Veatch bequest, the royalty income from Germany, was sufficient to meet our needs and to build an endowment for the future. Time has modified that reality, and we should talk about how we need to change and how our responsibilities as members have changed as well.

That is one of the reasons we have a Developmental Minister with us.

### The Marathon, Not the Sprint

Seven years ago, when members of the Social Justice Committee started advocating for the passage of the New York State HALT Solitary Confinement Act, a key legislator told us: "Remember. Passing HALT is a marathon, not a sprint." I have repeated those words often.

This past spring, we could really see the finish line. We had a majority in both legislative houses poised to vote in favor of the Act if only the leadership would bring the bill to their respective bodies for a vote. At the last minute, Gov. Andrew Cuomo met with the leadership, Senator Andrea Stewart Cousins and Assemblyman Carl Heastie, and convinced them that instead of holding a vote on HALT, they should agree to supporting very weak administrative changes. The finish line was moved once again!

The goal of the HALT Solitary Confinement Act is to end prolonged solitary by limiting time in isolation to no more than 15 days as stated in the UN Mandela Rules. HALT provides for separation when needed but not isolation. For those whose behavior poses a threat to themselves or others, placement in Rehabilitative Housing Units will afford them 7 hours of out of cell time and access to programming that will allow them to ultimately return to the general population.

What are the weaknesses of Governor Cuomo's administrative changes? Torturous lengths of time in solitary; indefinite solitary to continue via keep-lock; people most vulnerable to the harm of solitary left behind; solitary by another name in purported alternatives; endless warehousing in the flawed alternative units; far too many people to be held in solitary under insufficiently limited criteria; people to be forced to choose between safety and torture; lack of transparency and oversight; lack of training and procedural protections; and similarly problematic conditions in local jails. (For an explanation of these weaknesses: http://nycaic. org/resources/ and click on "Severe Limitations of Gov. Cuomo's Proposed Solitary Confinement Regulations," August 2019.) The 4,000 individuals now in solitary in NYS will have no immediate relief because the changes will not take effect for two years!

At our monthly Together to End Solitary service on Monday, September 23, at 6:30 PM in the Worship Room, we will share strategies developed at a recent retreat of HALT advocates. Please plan to join us.

It is clear to advocates for ending long term solitary confinement that we must pass HALT. On Wednesday, October 2, there will be rallies and demonstrations across the state in front of Gov. Cuomo's local offices calling attention to the inadequacy of the administrative changes to solitary and demanding the passage of HALT. Please mark your calendar for Tuesday, October 2, at 11 AM, and plan to join us. Watch congregational media for further details.

# Hurricane Dorian Reminds Us That Vulnerable Communities are Hardest Hit by Climate Change

The devastation wrought by Hurricane Dorian is an important reminder that climate change-fueled natural disasters hit the most vulnerable populations the hardest. It's no accident that the Abaco Islands in the Bahamas, home to a large Haitian immigrant community, was most decimated by the storm. This is why we partner with so many Veatch grantees to wage environmental justice campaigns aimed at lessening the disproportionate impact of climate change on low-income and immigrant communities.

Last year, the Asian Pacific Environmental Network, based in California, passed landmark legislation that includes one billion dollars in rooftop solar panels for low-income renters—the biggest program of its kind in the country. The SouthWest Organizing Project, based in New Mexico, continues to push the Air Force to clean up the jet fuel plume contaminating the drinking water for low-income neighborhoods in Albuquerque.

It can be overwhelming to figure out the best way to help in the acute moments following a disaster. For many Veatch grantees, serving their communities with disaster relief has become a "new normal." South Florida has a rich community of Bahamian immigrants, and many grantees there, including Miami Workers Center, Florida Immigrant Coalition, and New Florida Majority, are collecting goods and funds to help. When we traveled to Florida this year with Trustees and Veatch Governors, we learned firsthand how New Florida Majority has taken on the work of helping vulnerable communities to be prepared to serve as hubs for climate-change fueled storms, even while they fight to prevent further environmental deterioration. If you are looking for a place to contribute to relief efforts, you can donate to the efforts of Veatch grantees in Florida.

It's important to act in the crucial period following a natural disaster like Dorian, but it's also important to recognize, as Veatch grantees do, that the proactive, hard work of justice year round is what offers real hope to lessen the impact on vulnerable communities.

The Unitarian Universalist Veatch Program at Shelter Rock provides support for efforts within the religious and spiritual mission of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock where their purposes are best served by outside agencies acting under the Veatch Program and the Congregation.

This article reflects our stewardship of the earth and our commitment to the Seventh Principle.

### Recycling: Good or Bad?

Should we recycle everything? This is what environmentalists have proposed. But if we think about it, perhaps, recycling is like a two-edged sword. In other words, "Just because something is recyclable does not necessarily mean



that it's healthier and has a small footprint," says David Allaway, a senior policy analyst for Oregon's Department of Environment Quality.

Okay! Let's look at disposable packaging. Instead of maximizing recycling, we should be optimizing it. In other words, the question is: Should we recycle it, rather than can we recycle it? Since we are in a huge upheaval of recycling in the United States, one of the world's biggest contributors of trash, we should be reimagining our approach to waste.

What the state of Oregon is doing is investigating recycling by not pursuing zero-waste aspirations as many of our greenest cities do. It looks at nonrecyclable materials that have a lower environmental impact than recyclable alternatives. One example is nonrecyclable packaging. It does less harm. An unrecyclable laminated pouch containing tuna rather than a steel tuna can is less offensive to the environment. Also, an Amazon mailing pouch, for example, requires fewer resources used than a highly recyclable cardboard box. In fact, it was discovered harm by recyclable packages outdoes the non-recyclable ones in areas like climate, water conservation, smog, acidification, toxicity, pollution and resource depletion.

The problem is focusing on recycling as garbage, rather than on the environmental impacts of what we are producing and trashing afterward. The difficulty is that corporations and industries don't want to change, so everyone is focused on garbage pickups. Therefore, it is seen as a consumer and government problem rather than a production and manufacturing one.

If we want to have beneficial recycling, we must alter our focus and change policies. These should reflect not only a ban on single-use plastics, but ones that favor low environmental impact choices. Protection of our environment should come first along with conserving our natural resources. Recycling everything is not. It is up to us to start questioning our policies and politicians. Then our habitual way of viewing everything as recyclable will be changed. Hopefully, we can begin at a local level and see improvement in our trashed filled environment.
